AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TRAFFIC CODE, OF THE CITY OF WEBSTER GROVES, BY AMENDING CHAPTER 60, ARTICLE XVI “SCHEDULES”, SECTION 60.975 - SCHEDULE H “PARKING PROHIBITED” TO CREATE A NO PARKING ZONE ON THE NORTH SIDE OF FAIRLAWN AVENUE BETWEEN OAKWOOD AVENUE AND NEWPORT AVENUE

WHEREAS, the Council finds that it is in the best interest of the community, and the preservation of the health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of Webster Groves, to create a No Parking Zone on the north side of Fairlawn Avenue between Oakwood Avenue and Newport Avenue to allow appropriate roadway clearance for traffic and emergency vehicles due to the narrow width of the roadway.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEBSTER GROVES, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 60.975 - Schedule H of Chapter 60, the Traffic Code of Webster Groves, is hereby amended to create a No Parking Zone on the north side of Fairlawn Avenue between Oakwood Avenue and Newport Avenue at all times.

Section 2. The City Manager is hereby authorized and directed to erect the appropriate signs carrying out the intention of this ordinance.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be printed in the Code of Webster Groves.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF WEBSTER GROVES,
CHAPTER 2, "ADMINISTRATION"
BY AMENDING SECTION 2.010 "MEETINGS OF THE COUNCIL" AND SECTION 2.040
"ORDER OF BUSINESS; CONDUCT OF MEETINGS"**

WHEREAS, to make meeting times more flexible, and after receiving input from the public regarding the title related to speaker comments, the City Council desires to amend Chapter 2 of the Code of Webster Groves as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEBSTER GROVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 2, "Administration," Article I, "City Council and Mayor", Section 2.010 "Meetings of the Council", is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2.010. Meetings of the Council.

The Council shall meet regularly on the first and third Tuesdays of each month in the Council Chamber of the City Hall. Meetings will be held at a time set by the Council with adequate notice to the public. When the day of meeting falls on a legal holiday, the meeting shall be held on the day following, unless the Council shall decide otherwise. Special meetings may be called by the Mayor or Mayor Pro tempore, or by any two members of the Council by written request filed with the City Clerk. Notice of special meetings shall be given in writing to each member at least one day in advance of the meeting, stating the purpose of the special meeting. By consent of the council or for reason of lack of a quorum, a meeting may be adjourned to another date, no later than the next regular meeting date. (Ord. No. 8450, § 1, 4-5-05)

Section 2. Chapter 2, "Administration," Article I, "City Council and Mayor", 2.040. a(3) "Order of Business; Conduct of Meeting", is hereby amended to read as follows:

3. Remarks from the Community and Visitors

Section 3. This ordinance shall be printed in the Code of Webster Groves.

Section 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.

Remarks for the Good of Our Community

I am not a visitor :)

To share a different perspective on planning, the classic book, "The Tipping Point", is about how little ideas can make a big difference. I wish to share one little idea which has amazed me multiple times to date.

As preface, my Mailbag letter in Friday's paper was about how positive mutual trust between citizens and city leaders is the cornerstone of a thriving community.

Which brings me back to this little idea. As you know, City Council's role is to sit quietly, sometimes stone-faced and without emotion, and not respond to Remarks such as this or speakers such as me.

But I have seen Laura do something several times now that is new & different from anything I have ever witnessed any city leader do in the 20 years I have lived here.

Specifically, for certain citizens who have reached out for help or feedback, Laura's response as Mayor is, "It is not customary for City Council to respond to Remarks, but if you will leave your name and information, I will contact you so we can sit down and have a talk on your issue."

To Laura's great credit, versus a citizen getting absolutely no feedback from Council, think about how Laura's action makes these citizens feel and the positive message it sends to other citizens like me.

This is just one simple, little idea but it makes a such a big difference in building trust and faith in city governance and making our citizens feel valued, feel good about themselves and feel a part of something bigger than themselves.

Thus, I ask you: at the end of the day, is there any higher purpose for City Council & Staff? I don't think so.

In closing, the big ideas certainly matter, but please do not overlook the little ideas that can make a big difference in creating and shaping Webster's future!!!

This event has always been an uplifting and fun community experience for me and my family. Sadly, yesterday's Highland Park parade shooting made me recognize that my family and I have always felt safe while attending our City's annual parade – something I took for granted until now. My heart goes out to all of those affected by the Highland Park shooter.

The Highland Park parade shooting made me doubt the importance of further pursuing my suggestion that Webster Groves provide a reserved, easy-to-access parade-viewing location for those with disabilities. As I reflected on the horror of what Highland Park experienced yesterday, I realized that the shooter's actions should not deter me from continuing to ask our City to provide equitable and inclusive parade-viewing seating arrangements for its residents and visitors because, "The ADA ... guarantees that people with disabilities have the same opportunities as everyone else to participate in the mainstream of American life." Introduction to the ADA

I believe that attending a Fourth of July parade is an excellent example of American life.

As a result, I'll continue to request that our City provide a reserved, easy-to-access parade-viewing location for those with disabilities even though Webster Groves refuses to do so. I feel this way because while the newly suggested area for my father-in-law's parade viewing was a reasonable one:

- It was not publicly communicated. I knew about this accommodation only because I inquired multiple times over multiple years.
- It was not an ideal location for an 87-year-old with physical disabilities: there was a great distance from the Holy Redeemer parking lot to the parade route for one in a wheelchair, and the location provided little to no shade at 10 a.m.

To encourage the City to provide this access, I have reached out to numerous Council Members via email since 2019. As a result, I exchanged emails and had a brief face-to-face conversation with Council Member Franklin (copied on this email) who expressed support for my request. However, after three years, the outcome remains the same: *no action by the City to treat residents and visitors with disabilities in an equitable manner by providing them with a reserved and easy-to-access space at its annual Community Days parade.*

Looking back at how the City's response to my request unfolded, the City found my initial 2019 request worthy of seeking an advisory opinion from the Department of Justice to ensure, I assume, that it wasn't violating any ADA regulations. However, upon receiving the DOJ's opinion, the City chose to accept this opinion and take no action rather than choosing to equitably serve those with disabilities by creating a reserved parade viewing space.

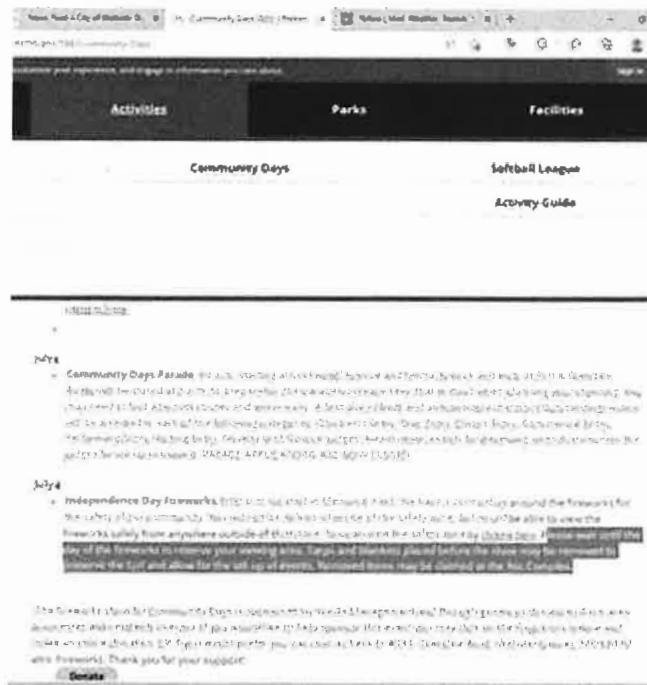
In 2022, the City continued its blatant refusal to accommodate those with disabilities by repeating the legalistic excuse that our community is “under no legal obligation to provide ADA accessible viewing area, as the City does not provide seating or designated areas for anyone along the parade route.”

The City’s use of this loophole is sadly ironic given that its Inclusion Statement (found on its website) claims:

“Webster Groves welcomes and supports the unique and individual qualities of each resident, business owner, employee, and visitor to our community. We are committed to promoting diversity, respectful conduct, and equitable service; we strive to be an inclusive place for all, and we condemn discrimination.” [Diversity, Equity & Inclusion | Webster Groves, MO - Official Website \(webstergrovesmo.gov\)](https://www.webstergrovesmo.gov/Community/Inclusion)

If Webster Groves strives to be an inclusive place for all, can a City leader please explain to me why:

- **The City manages the parade in a way that is not equitable nor inclusive.** By not providing a designated, reserved seating area for those with disabilities while, at the same time, allowing people to reserve seating along large and/or desirable portions of the parade route many days prior to the event likely excludes residents and visitors from attending and publicly conveys a message that the City wants to exclude people from participating in the event.
- **The City does not publicly communicate how residents and visitors can view the parade in a way that is accessible and equitable to all.** None of the 2022 parade content on the City’s website included any information on this important logistical topic (e.g., locations for those with disabilities to park and view the parade [or fireworks], an equitable way for parade goers to reserve seating along the parade route). In contrast, the City provided specific guidelines for fireworks seating/viewing but lacked instructions on parade seating for those with disabilities.



Webster Groves' response to my request on this matter reflects a City that is not respectful and equitable toward those with disabilities. I hope to receive additional input from the City to help me understand why my request is not possible in future years. Simply stating that the city is "under no legal obligation (by the DOJ)" to do so is a poor reason.

RESOLUTION #2022-32

A RESOLUTION RESTATING AND AFFIRMING ORDINANCE NO. 7669 WHICH ESTABLISHED SECTION 2.080 OF THE CODE OF WEBSTER GROVES, "COMPLIANCE WITH THE STATE CONFLICT OF INTEREST LAW"

WHEREAS, in September 1991, the City Council of the City of Webster Groves enacted Ordinance No. 7669 which established a new Section 2.080 of the Code of Webster Groves entitled "Compliance with State Conflict of Interest Law" and provided a procedure to disclose potential conflicts of interest and substantial interest of certain public officials; and

WHEREAS, the Missouri Ethics Commission has issued its opinion that the Missouri Statute, which allows political subdivisions to establish their own method of disclosing potential conflicts of interest and substantial interest of public officials, also suggests that such provisions should be adopted by the political subdivision by ordinance, order or resolution at an open meeting by September 15th; and

WHEREAS, inasmuch as the provisions of Ordinance No. 7669 are now a part of the Code of Webster Groves, it would be inappropriate to repeal and reenact by ordinance such provisions each year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Webster Groves does hereby restate and affirm the provisions of Ordinance No. 7669 enacted by the Council on September 3, 1991, a copy of which is attached hereto, and directs the City Manager to file this Resolution and Ordinance No. 7669 with the Missouri Ethics Commission within 10 days of the date of adoption of this Resolution.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2, ARTICLE I, BY ADDING A NEW SECTION 2.080 "COMPLIANCE WITH STATE CONFLICT OF INTEREST LAW" OF THE CODE OF WEBSTER GROVES WHICH ESTABLISHES A PROCEDURE TO DISCLOSE POTENTIAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST AND SUBSTANTIAL INTERESTS FOR CERTAIN OFFICIALS.

WHEREAS, in recognition that the proper operation of government requires that public officials and employees be independent, impartial and responsible to the people, and that government decisions and policy be made in the proper channels of the governmental structure, and that public office not be used for personal gain, and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its government, the Council of the City of Webster Groves hereby strengthens its existing conflicts of interests ordinance and establishes a procedure for disclosure by certain officials and employees of private financial or other interests in matters affecting the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEBSTER GROVES, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 2, Article I of the Code of Webster Groves is hereby amended by adding a new Sec. 2.080 "Compliance with State Conflict of Interest Law" which shall read as follows:

"Section 2.080. Compliance with State Conflict of Interest Law.

(a) State Conflict of Interest Law. All elected and appointed officials as well as employees of the City must comply with section 105.454 of Missouri Revised Statutes on conflicts of interest as well as any other state law governing official conduct.

(b) Disclosure to City Clerk of Conflict of Interest. Any member of the governing body of the City who has a "substantial or private interest" in any measure, bill, order or ordinance proposed or pending before such governing body must disclose that interest to the City Clerk and such disclosure shall be recorded in the appropriate journal of the City. For the purposes of this section, substantial or private interest is defined as ownership by the individual, his spouse, or his dependent children, whether singularly or

collectively, directly or indirectly of: (1) 10% or more of any business entity; or (2) an interest having a value of \$10,000 or more; or (3) the receipt of a salary, gratuity, or other compensation or remuneration of \$5,000 or more, per year from any individual, partnership, organization, or association within any calendar year.

(c) Disclosure Reports. Each elected official, the City Manager, the chief purchasing officer as identified in section 105.483(11) of the Missouri Revised Statutes, and the full-time general counsel, if any, shall disclose the following information by May 1 if any such transactions occurred during the previous calendar year:

(1) For such person, and all persons within the first degree of consanguinity or affinity of such person, the date and the identities of the parties to each transaction with a total value in excess of five hundred dollars, if any, that such person had with the City, other than compensation received as an employee or payment of any tax, fee or penalty due to the City, and other than transfers for no consideration to the City.

(2) The date and the identities of the parties to each transaction known to the person with a total value in excess of five hundred dollars, if any, that any business entity in which such person had a substantial interest, had with the City, other than payment of any tax, fee or penalty due to the City or transactions involving payment for providing utility service to the City, and other than transfers for no consideration to the City.

(3) The City Manager and the chief purchasing officer also shall disclose by May 1 for the previous calendar year the following information:

A. The name and address of each of the employers of such person from whom income of one thousand dollars or more was received during the year covered by the statement;

B. The name and address of each sole proprietorship that he owned, the name, address and the general nature of the business conducted of each general partnership and name and address of each partner or coparticipant for each partnership or joint venture unless such names and addresses are filed by the partnership or joint venture with the Secretary of State; the name, address and

general nature of the business conducted of any closely held corporation or limited partnership in which the person owned ten percent (10%) or more of any class of the outstanding stock or limited partnership units; and the name of any publicly traded corporation or limited partnership that is listed on a regulated stock exchange or automated quotation system in which the person owned stock, limited partnership units or other equity interests;

C. The name and address of each corporation for which such person served in the capacity of a director, officer or receiver.

(d) Filing of Reports. The financial interest statements shall be filed at the following times, but no person is required to file more than one financial interest statement in any calendar year;

(1) Every person required to file a financial interest statement shall file the statement annually not later than May 1 and the statement shall cover the calendar year ending the immediately preceding December 31; provided that any member of the City Council may supplement the financial interest statement to report additional interests acquired after December 31 of the covered year until the date of filing of the financial interest statement.

(2) Each person appointed to office shall file the statement within thirty (30) days of such appointment or employment.

Financial disclosure reports giving the financial information required in subsection (c) shall be filed with the City Clerk and with the Secretary of State prior to January 1, 1993. After January 1, 1993, reports shall be filed with the City Clerk and the Missouri ethics commission. The reports shall be available for public inspection and copying during normal business hours."

Section 2. A certified copy of this ordinance shall be sent within ten (10) days of its adoption to the Secretary of State's office. A certified copy of any ordinance adopted on or after January 1, 1993, shall be sent to the Missouri Ethics Commission within ten (10) days of its adoption.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are to the extent of such conflict, are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be printed in the Code of Webster Groves.

Section 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage as provided by law.

RESOLUTION 2022-33

AMENDING THE BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023

WHEREAS, the City of Webster Groves will receive insurance claim proceeds due to a vehicle accident that caused the destruction of certain lighting poles in the Gazebo Park and expenditure authority is needed in the General Fund to purchase and erect the pole replacements; and

WHEREAS, the New Fire House #2 Fund requires expenditure authority for small expenses in FY2023 as the project nears completion, and the Old Webster Special Business District Fund requires additional expenditure authority for the Congregation Church Parking Lot lease.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Webster Groves, Missouri, that the Annual Budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022, is hereby amended to appropriate an increase in the amount of expenditures of \$30,206, as prepared by the City Manager and presented to the City Council on this date for Fiscal Year 2023; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in accordance with Section 5.14 of the City Charter, \$23,238 is appropriated as expenditures to the General Fund, \$1,968 is appropriated as expenditures to the Old Webster Special Business District Fund, and \$5,000 is appropriated as expenditures to the New Fire House #2 Fund for Fiscal Year 2023.
